Homelessness to a Home

The Homelessness to a Home program secures permanent housing for people placed in hotels and motels throughout the COVID-19 pandemic and provides ongoing support.

"It's a circuit breaker," says Uniting's acting co-ordinator of housing and homelessness services in Ballarat, Adam Liversage.

"We hope to prove this is a successful model and stop the revolving door into homelessness."

The team in Ballarat has prioritised 74 people or households out of more than 700 who are eligible.

The Victorian government is supplying 15 social housing properties and is purchasing 18 more from the private market.

Uniting is supplying 35 properties, some that are existing and the others through new leasing arrangements.

The new arrangement will see Uniting sign the lease with the real estate agent and the tenant signs the lease through us.

The tenant pays 25% of their income as rent and the program makes up the difference.

"It's lucrative for landlords. We are responsible for damages and the rent. The rent gets paid regardless of whether it is tenanted or not."

"Once a person or family is placed in a property, Uniting support continues for up to 18 months.

"This support gives people the best opportunity to sustain their tenancy moving forward," says Adam.
