# Speaking out to end homelessness

We were recently invited to present to the Victorian Government's Inquiry into Homelessness in Victoria.

Uniting Vic.Tas representatives, CEO Bronwyn Pike and Senior Manager of Homelessness Services, Jenny Smith provided evidence to the Inquiry in early July.

During her presentation, Bronwyn noted how people experiencing homelessness in Melbourne were being provided temporary accommodation during the COVID-19 pandemic.

We think this is something that has been a very positive outcome for people who are experiencing homelessness in Melbourne," Bronwyn said. "We often say that Melbourne is a modern and sophisticated city, as part of a modern and sophisticated state, and that Victorians do not like the idea of people sleeping rough on our streets for a range of reasons — for the safety of those sleeping rough and also for the public's safety and wellbeing.

"There is not much good that has come out of COVID-19, but if this can be an opportunity that we grab hold of to support these people into longer-term and more secure housing, then that is a great outcome."

Thank you to everyone who has registered to make reusable, fabric face masks for Uniting Vic.Tas and Uniting AgeWell services.

We have received more than 100 registrations with over 3200 face masks pledged – an amazing effort by all involved.

Our warehouse has already received and distributed 2150 homemade face masks.

Health authorities have made it mandatory for all Victorian residents to wear a face covering when outside their home.

Due to the significant increase in demand for face masks, many vulnerable and marginalised people in our communities are unable to access them, putting them and others at risk.

The Coffee Cup Challenge is a great way for congregations to add an extra dimension to their Pancake Day fundraising activities.

Initiated by St Leonard's Brighton Beach Uniting Church, the Coffee Cup Challenge encourages participants to put aside the cost of a cup of coffee each week from International Coffee Day on 1 October until Shrove Tuesday (or Pancake Day) in February or March.
