
A prelude to Christmas

"People who come to us just don't have enough money to live on," she says.

"The cost of living is going up and up. And often people can't even buy food.

"They become very reliant on services like ours."

Maidie says congregations have always been huge contributors to Uniting's Food For Families Appeal, one of Uniting's programs dedicated to supporting families and individuals in crisis by providing them with non-perishable foods and essential household items.

"The Food For Families Appeal is a great program to get behind, particularly around the Christmas time of giving.

Can't afford to live

"My children continue missing out on things, simply because I have to buy food."

New research conducted by Uniting Vic.Tas and Swinburne University's Centre for Social Impact, has uncovered the devastating impact of the rising cost of living.

112 people on low-incomes including those on income support, as well as people working full-time, parents, carers and retirees were surveyed. It found:

- 92% were cutting back on food and groceries
- 85% of parents with children under 18 were experiencing poor mental health
- Women were more likely than men to be bearing the brunt of cost-of-living pressures
- More than 1 in 10 reported an increased risk of family violence due to financial strain.

"People can only live a safe and dignified life if they can afford life's essentials and can live free from constant worry about how they will keep a roof over their heads and food on their table," said Bronwyn Pike, Uniting Vic.Tas CEO.
