As part of the Sermon on the Mount Jesus said to his followers, and says to us, "You are the salt of the earth..." (Matthew 5:13).

As we discussed in worship on February 5th, common salt, Sodium Chloride, is such a useful compound. For millennia before the invention of the refrigerator it was used to preserve various foodstuffs. Salted beef anyone?

Salty water ... saline ... has healing properties and is used extensively in the medical world: everything from cleaning wounds to being injected to reverse dehydration. Salt is scattered on roads in the places where there is snow to decrease the freezing point of water and thus turn snow and ice into water. Salt is used in many chemical reactions. It is used to thicken shampoo. (If you ever make the mistake of tasting shampoo, you will find it is salty.)

Salt exists as crystals that can be mined from huge underground deposits or extracted by evaporation from the sea or other salty bodies of water. (This region, of course, had two major salt evaporation facilities: one at Avalon and the other at Point Henry. Both run by Cheetham Salt.) It is a bit of a wonder substance is good old salt.

And, of course, then there is salt's capacity to add flavour to food.

Now we know these days that too much salt can affect blood pressure, but that said, nearly every cook or chef on the SBS food channel adds common salt to savoury dishes. A little bit of salt can really bring out the flavour! Fish and chips need salt, don't they?

The people of God are called to be like salt to flavour the whole.

Jesus began his Sermon on the Mount, according to Matthew, with the Beatitudes which make clear that the most unusual people are blessed by God: the poor, the meek, those who mourn, the persecuted, the peacemakers.

The Beatitudes give us an insight into God's vision for the world, a vision that is so often completely at odds with human thinking. Seeking to live the way of the Beatitudes is to flavour the whole of life. It makes a difference!

This is not just a job just for public prophets like Father Bob or Rev. Tim Costello, or indeed just ministers and pastors. It is something that we are all called to do and can do.

Every one of us can make a difference. We can flavour the places we inhabit from our extended families to retirement villages, from schools to workplaces, from organisation for which we volunteer to sports club.

And we do not do this alone, as Paul reminds us, we have the Holy Spirit with us and we are blessed with the Spirit's gifts.

Just think about this, Jesus says to us: "You are the salt of the earth..."

Salt flavours a whole meal.

Salt can bring healing.

So can we!

On Monday morning I had the privilege of visiting Mahar and Patricia, two members of a Syrian family living in Roslyn Road. The family has only been in the country for four or five weeks after four years of living in virtual isolation in Syria. Leaving their home was a dangerous undertaking.

The friends they made in Syria have moved to Brisbane and one day they would like to visit. However, they are very impressed with the climate of Geelong.

Patricia, who is 18, has some English while Mahar will benefit from 'newcomer' English classes from Cultura. Patricia is hoping to go to Belmont High School to do Year 12 or Year 11 dependent on how her interview goes. Younger brother, Pierre, 17 will also attend Belmont High. Hopefully by the time you read this article, the young people will know when they'll start school.

Patricia has learnt her English in relatively 'quick time'. She has spent time watching television and YouTube discovering that there are many different types of English and ours is the hardest! I can understand that!

Syrian custom and culture is such that you can offend your hosts by not eating and drinking what they prepare for you. Consequently I had to eat and drink over my lunchtime capacity. Grateful thanks to Shaghek for being my interpreter. This family are wonderful people with a good sense of humour and I'm so pleased I've made this contact.

Please think about doing the same - it is a great privilege to visit the home or temporary home of newcomers.

A VISIT TO KHATOON

This past week one of our older 'newcomers' had her second cataract operation. Naturally she was feeling a little anxious and so a visit from Paul, Shaghek and I was arranged. Am unsure whether this was helpful or not - being inundated by the 3 Musketeers!?

Actually Khatoon was really pleased. She showered us with hospitality and Salam, working from home, was part of the conversation. Khatoon's English is not her strong suit so Shaghek and Salam were able to help Paul and I.

Khatoon is a strong Christian and she calls Paul 'father'. We shared a prayer and Bible reading in Arabic and English. Khartoum's operation was successful and she is now recovering well.

St. Luke's is holding a family picnic, sponsored by Messy Church, to celebrate the start of the year!




