

Being Pilgrims

While our recent long holiday had elements of an adventure and a time of relaxation, it also had a faith dimension. Here are some my faith related reflections on our travels in the United Kingdom, the Irish Republic, Croatia and Italy.

People

We enjoyed listening to and learning from the many people we met on our travels. And for whatever reason sometimes we found ourselves with the privilege of listening to people sharing at some depth. The ex-publican in Cornwall, for example, who told us with tears in his eyes about how he saved his son from certain drowning; and how they were both eventually saved through the selfless efforts of the Port Isaac lifeboat crew. Then there were the people in the village in Croatia where we stayed, who shared with us some of their grief following the tragic death of a young person. These and many other experiences reminded us that we are all made in the image of God, and we all need to be heard when things are tough.

Faith was still part of the language

In all the places we went, whether people were believers or not, we discovered that matters of faith was still part of daily life and remain part of daily conversations. This was highlighted for us in Croatia where the government is overturning laws from its communist past. Laws have been recently pasted to end shops being open 24/7 and requiring many shops to be closed on Sundays ... to give a day of rest for people. This seemed so different to our experience here in Australia where matters of faith do not easily arise in daily conversation ... and the church seems only ever to be discussed negatively in the media.

Saints

We found ourselves in each place we visited rubbing up against the valuing of different particular saints. In Cornwall it was St Piran who is the patron saint of tin miners. In Ireland it

was, of course, Saint Patrick. In the part of Croatia we visited, it was Saint Blaise who is venerated because he is credited with saving Dubrovnik from invasion by the Venetians

around a thousand years ago. And finally, we spent a week riding around the area of Italy called Umbria with our ride beginning and ending in the medieval town of Assisi. There, of course, the focus was on Saint Francis but also Saint Clare. We were moved to see one of Francis' robes (see right) which reflected his commitment to a simple life. It was quite interesting to think how Francis had rejected wealth and a role in his father's fabric business as we wandered a few days later around the streets of Florence the home of such companies as Gucci and Ferragamo.



Prayer and connection with the Psalm

We found it hard to go to a normal Sunday worship service on our travels, but we visited many, many churches ... sometimes only to briefly get a sense of these often-ancient places of worship and prayer. Sometimes these were large cathedrals, but other times small village churches. Sometimes these churches were filled with visitors and other times hardly anyone was present.

Wherever we went there were opportunities for people to offer prayers in some way or other. In Cornwall we visited a very simple, rather rough and ready church near a well named after St Piran, there was no one there but there were resources for Celtic prayer and prayerful silence ... which we used and took with us. In one quite large church in a small village in Umbria I slipped in for a few minutes ... there was one woman kneeling there, lost in silent prayer. You could be cynical and think that the visitors to some churches were only interested in the architecture, but we saw people taking the opportunity to light prayer candles ...and often there were ranks of candles burning in many of the churches into which we went. People clearly were calling out to God ... longing for God. We saw many people reflecting the words of the writer of **Psalm 130**.

¹ Out of the depths I cry to you, O LORD. ² Lord, hear my voice! Let your ears be attentive to the voice of my supplications!

Inspired by our experiences and the words of the writer of Psalm 130, I penned these words for the call to worship for June 30^{th} :

There is a longing deep within our beings; **A longing for genuine hope and abundant life for all.** There is a longing deep within our beings; **A longing to be accepted and loved for who we are.** There is a longing deep within our beings; **A longing for a world where peace and justice reign.** There is a longing deep within our beings; **A longing to which the living God responds.** So with the writer of the psalm we say: **Our hope is in God!** With God there is steadfast love and the power to redeem.



Let us worship God ... the God who has come amongst us in the person of Jesus and who is present now through the power of the Holy Spirit.

Environment Groups Combined Efforts

The Environment Groups from St Luke's, Wesley, Western Heights and Belmont have been combining their efforts for greater impact in various activities. We have already joined together for Clean Up Australia Day and will do so again later this year in October. The same has happened with "Seasons of Creation" and that will also happen again this year in September. We are also combining re climate change. You will have noticed above the Recycling Bay, the display



showing what the Uniting Church states re climate change and the goals set by the Uniting Church re emissions by 2024. Please have a read if you haven't already. This joining of the 4 environment groups means we can achieve bigger goals in our work.

Plastic-Free July

We have mounted a display in the hall with information re plastic and the harm it is doing to us and the environment. Pointers on how we can change our habits; either eliminate, or recycle, or actively campaign and petition to reduce just one more type of plastic packaging from your lifestyle. Then do the same in August. Then September; then October, ..

Recycling Bay

There have been a few changes to the Environment Action Group Recycling Bay in the foyer. We now have a carton for collection of <u>medicine blister-packs</u>. For a short introductory period, City of Greater Geelong sponsored Highton Rotary to organise the collection of medicine blister-packs by a number of pharmacies around Geelong for recycling by Pharmacycle. But to assist you further, there is now also a small collection carton on the Environment Action Group Recycling Bay in the foyer where those who may find it more difficult to travel to one of the above pharmacies may leave their used medicine-blister packs for recycling.

PCs FOR KIDS now recycle small items of e-Waste. Instead of going all the way out to the City of Greater Geelong Resource Recovery Centre in Douro St, much of the small electrical and electronic e-Waste put in the e-Waste bin on the Environment Action Group trolley in the foyer is now being taken to PCs for Kids in Newtown. PCs for Kids is a self-funded volunteer charity who, for many years, have repaired and rebuilt computers from donated equipment. Rebuilt computers and laptops are donated, free of charge, to children who do not have access to a suitable computer. The child must be nominated by a relevant support organisation. Maintaining

a stock of computers for children in need is still their primary priority - 89 computers were provided free of charge in 2023. But since 2020, a small computer repair service shop, sale of some refurbished and rebuilt computers from that repair shop, and more focused recycling of high value e-Waste, has meant they have been able to donate additional money to primary schools, enabling activities such as camps to benefit even more children - from 2020 until 2022, 16 schools in the Geelong and Bellarine region received 43 donations, totalling \$104,000. In their e-Waste operations, PCs for Kids accept and dismantle to sell to metals and electronics parts recyclers, many home electrical or electronic appliances up to the size of a typical kitchen microwave unit; all kitchen bench appliances, hair dryers, irons, small portable heaters, remote controls, electronic toys, headphones, vacuum cleaners, clock-radios, TVs and computer monitors, hi-fi and audio equipment, old telephones, workshop equipment, etc.

St Lukes Men's Shed also dismantle some failed electrical appliances and sell the steel, motors, copper, aluminium, and other high value metals. Small items which Men's Shed choose not to dismantle will now be taken to PCs for Kids, for them to recover value from recycling. So please, consider where to take your e-Waste for recycling.

July Opening: Friday 19th July, 12 noon - 4pm; Saturday 20th July from 9am till lunchtime. You are invited. Bring friends. Tell us where you are from. Help share our story.

Do you know: That the Refugee Chapel Room stocks: blankets, doonas, bed linen, towels, tea towels, hand towels, mugs, cutlery, glasses, baking trays, saucepans, dinner sets, crockery, tablecloths, and vases. A number of refugee families are welcomed each week, for supplies.

Do you know: Every Wednesday, the Wednesday Team are available to receive donations. Simply drive between the Chapel and Men's Shed to off load. We would proudly walk you through the Chapel when you arrive, so we can share the story. We can help: It does become a worry if you are downsizing. Not wanting to 'land fill' And not knowing what to do with your treasures is a real concern. Please note that we will accept all household items (white goods, furniture, garden tools, pot plants etc.) The only things we cannot take are electric blankets and bed pillows.

This month we stock: Collections of Royal Doulton, Wedgwood, silverware, Royal Albert porcelain, CarltonWare, telephones, cameras, jewellery, collections from Scotland, Greece, Ireland, Australia, England and Holland, figurines, salt/pepper shakers, Golden Books, art works, and doilies. National Update (1 - 7 July 2024)
