"Learning from St. Francis about following Jesus" (1)

Francis sought to follow Jesus in a radical and passionate way. He sought to take seriously Jesus teaching in the Sermon on the Mount and what it means for the church to be salt and light in the world.

My own interest in St Francis and his colleague St Clare has been heightened by the time we spent in Assisi in Italy in June this year.

This is a summary of the themes from the teaching of Francis that I shared in a recent sermon. **Things were crook in the Church.** Francis lived between 1182 and 1226. This was an era in which the church in the West was corrupted by its relationship with earthly powers; when bishops ruled kingdoms and Popes ordered crusades and bloodshed.



Francis had a vision of Christ telling him to rebuild the church. Jesus spoke to him while he was praying in the ruins of the church of San Damiano and said, "Francis, rebuild my church, which, as you see, is falling down." (2)

The Uniting Church's *Basis of Union* declares that the church is called to be always open to continuing reform under Christ. (para 1.)

Encounter with God

Francis' own faith was grounded in silence and prayer. He emphasised the importance of personal encounter with God. For him faith was not something you just talked about, but you engaged in. It involved prayer, love and action.⁽³⁾

The Church as an evangelical Community

The greatest witness to the way of Christ for Francis was a church that in its actual life reflected the teaching and way of Jesus. Recent thinkers reflecting on the place of the church in western countries like Lesslie Newbigin have underlined this ... suggesting that the most potent way of confronting the atheism of the western world are congregations of faith living the Gospel. Dignity of all human beings ... peace making

In following Jesus, Francis did as Jesus did. He touched and sought to heal lepers. He cared for the broken and the outcast. There are many stories about this. He was totally opposed to violence, and he was committed to peacemaking. It is said that he and a colleague travelled to Egypt, and in seeking a peaceful end to a crusade went to see a Muslim Sultan and had an amicable engagement with him. [5]

Simplicity

One writer notes that: "Francis prescribed simplicity as an antidote to our often unquenchable yearning for more and ever more." [6] Another writer summaries the "essence and foundation" of both his life and the life of Clare as "poverty." [7] Francis and Clare saw the enormous wealth of the church of their day as a deep spiritual sickness. I suspect many of us yearn to be able to live simpler lives, how might we actually do this?

Respect for God's creation and his valuing of the beauty of God's world

Francis is well known for his engagement with creation. He wrote *The Canticle of the Sun* in which he gives thanks to God for Brother Sun, Sister Moon, Brother wind, water, fire and earth ... all of which give praise to God. There are many stories about him having a great love for animals and the world. There is the story that he preached to the birds and Bob Tantau's painting of this event hangs on the wall at St Luke's. Pope John Paul II made him patron saint of ecology in 1979.

Summary

Francis in seeking to radically and passionately follow Jesus had a powerful word to his time about the role of the church and the joy of the Gospel. How does his teaching challenge each of us, and us as a church community, today?

Prayer of confession

O Lord, you are our shepherd,

And yet we don't always acknowledge this.

You invite us to rest in quiet green pastures and be refreshed with your living water for the journey, but too often we ignore your invitation, and instead just keep doing things in our own strength.

Instead of following you, we tend to wander off along other paths.

We too often forget that in the darkest valleys in life you are right there with us ... offering your comfort and support.

We are not so great at setting a table for all and we struggle to break bread with those who are our enemies.

We see scarcity even when you offer us abundance.

We pray for forgiveness, for your goodness and mercy,

o that we might dwell in You, in your grace, forever.

Amen.

Transition Process for a new Minister

Most of you would be aware by now that Rev Paul Stephens is retiring and will conclude his placement on January 5th, 2025. This has triggered a process which aims to discern the future mission directions and ministry needs of the congregation as well as then moving to consider the calling of a new minister. In this article, I explain what happens to achieve this and look at some of the challenges and how we might respond to these.

The Process

The UCA has established this process with the goal of calling a new minister – one who is in tune with the needs and aspirations of the congregation. The first step is a **Mission Study** "to identify the congregation's mission and ministry emphases and goals for the next 3 – 5 years"

(Doc 1.1, p.3). You might recall that a mission study was previously conducted at St Luke's in September 2017.

The Presbytery and Congregation jointly conduct a mission study. This will then determine the priority of the vacancy and the ways in which the position might be filled. Members of the Congregation are invited to participate in the process which is overseen and guided by the Presbytery Pastoral Relations Committee (PRC).

A Congregational Profile is then prepared and together with the proposed Terms of Placement is submitted for approval by the Church Council and Presbytery and forwarded to the Placements Committee who ideally will nominate candidates to fill the role.

Challenges

With the shortage of Ministers across the country, it could be difficult to find a suitable person. In the interim, the congregation will need to consider ways in which its ministry needs will be met. These could include arranging for a supply ministry for short periods up to a year, having services conducted by suitably qualified members of the congregation or participating in services conducted by another congregation, either online or in person.

Financial decisions will also need to be made. With increasing costs and reduced incomes, many congregations will need to assess whether they can continue to afford full-time ministers. This has become a trigger for some congregations to share ministry.

Our Response

St Luke's Council will soon be calling for members to offer to participate in conducting the Mission Study under the guidance of members of the PRC. All members will be invited to participate in the reflection and discussion that is part of this process.

These reflections may well lead to new directions for St Luke's, such as a greater alignment with other congregations across the region. While this might be challenging for some members, we all need to open our hearts to support each other as we seek the Spirit's guidance.

Raising funds for Refugee Ministry

Are you our first time reader? Then, I welcome you to enjoy reading our story. A story committed to supporting Refugee Families, and others in need. A story that began at St Luke's in 2005 when we learnt about refugees sleeping on the floor without blankets. We held a blanket appeal and since then we have provided material aid to families from 26 countries



as they transition into Australia. Most years, we have provided material aid on average to 150 homes. St Lukes Church Council and Congregation agreed to focus our Mission towards Refugee Ministry and to others in need, as we attempt to live out God's mission within the Community. The Church now employs Shaghek Qassabyan as a Community Ministry Worker. St Luke's also employs other newcomers for church cleaning, carpet cleaning, groundsman, and for Testing and Tagging electrical items.

September Open Days Once again the Chapel Collectibles and Popup looked fresh and new, thanks to the dedicated Wednesday Team who prepared the display for many donated items.

During September we welcomed a Group from Geelong Day View Club for morning tea and a Collectibles tour of the Chapel. It was a happy occasion, providing the Collectibles Team the opportunity to share the story of our Ministry to Refugees.

Do you know: That we accept all household donations other than electric blankets and bed pillows. Household donations can include garden potted plants, tools, all kitchen and linen cupboard items, white goods and small furniture.

Do you know: Every Wednesday, between 9.30 am and lunch time, the Wednesday Team are available to receive donations. Simply drive between the Chapel and Men's Shed to off load.

We can help you: It can become a worry if you are downsizing. Not wanting to 'land fill' And not knowing what to do with your treasures is a real concern. Give us a call. We can help you and in turn help people in need. All monies raised supports our Refugee Ministry.

This month many amazing things happened (Here are couple of things):

- 1. Nineteen (19) families visited our refugee room for material aid.
- 2. As a part of their Community Service, the Barwon Trefoil Guides have committed to restoring and cleaning donated silverware prior to sale.

SUPPORT FOR THE TREATY PROCESS IN VICTORIA



Serve one another

humbly in love

We, the Uniting Church in Australia, Synod of Victoria and Tasmania acknowledge the Traditional Owners of the lands where we do our ministry across Victoria. We pay our respects to their Elders past and present and recognise that sovereignty was never ceded. We acknowledge the Covenant relationship that we have with the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress.

We acknowledge that when it comes to First Peoples communities, cultures and lands, the true experts are of course First Peoples themselves, and we are grateful for the leadership of the First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria.

We acknowledge that the past cannot be altered or erased, but we choose to take steps today that will foster healing in the enduring pain caused by injustices. As an organisation firmly committed to advancing social justice and equality, we want to play our part in righting the wrongs of the past and be part of collaborating towards a better future together.

We believe a better tomorrow is possible. Consistent with the Church's declared support for the principles in the Statement from the Heart, we commit our support to the First Peoples' Treaty process in Victoria.

To help build support for the shared journey to Treaty, we will:

- Collaborate with the First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria on the advancement of a Treaty in Victoria;
- Advocate in support of the Treaty process;
- Continue to provide information to our congregations and faith communities about the Treaty process and its importance to First Peoples, as a significant step to address some of the injustices of racist colonialism;
- Encourage members of Congress Victoria to enroll to vote and participate in the First Peoples' Assembly processes as they work on the advancement of Treaty in Victoria

Continue to develop and communicate a clear theologically robust rationale for supporting the Victorian Treaty process;

- Inform church members about the role of churches in past injustices related to First Peoples in Victoria;
- Encourage our congregations and faith communities to o learn the stories of First Peoples in their areas; o acknowledge Country in their services and meetings;
 - seek to forge relationships with the Traditional Owners in the places where they are situated;
 - o consider how they might support the Treaty process
- Partner with other churches and organisations, as appropriate, to foster the Victorian community's acceptance and embrace of the Treaty process.

In making this commitment, we affirm the right of self-determination for First Peoples in charting a path towards Treaty.

The Uniting Church in Australia, Synod of Victoria and Tasmania, and the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress Victorian Regional Council, are united in this support. Together, all Victorians can create a future where First Peoples' voices are heard, rights are respected, and justice is realised for generations to come.
